What will happen to children who have bullied others?

What is bullying?

Bullying is when someone hurts, frighten or upsets someone else more than once on purpose.

Bullying is NOT...

- Accidents
- Falling out with friends
- Something that only happens once

Bullying can be...

Verbal: Name calling or saying unkind things about the what someone looks, their race, their family or their religion.

Emotional: Hurting people's feelings by leaving them out or ignoring them.

Physical: Pushing and kicking or taking things that belong to someone else.

Cyber: Saying unkind or hurtful things on social media, the internet or in text messages.



If you are bullied:

- Remember it's not your fault.
- Tell an adult straight away
- Tell them to STOP if you can.
- Just walk away.

If you see someone being bullied, you must tell an adult straight away.

The teachers will:

- Take you seriously
- Talk to everyone involved.
- Deal with children who have been bullying others.
- Help you to feel safe at school.
